# Navigating the Job Market:

## A Resource Guide for Bronx Residents Looking for Work

### OVERVIEW:

In today's rough economic state and with high unemployment rates, seeking employment may feel like a job in itself. Often times, when unsuccessful, negative emotions can surface leaving the job seeker feeling unmotivated and powerless. University Neighborhood Housing Program (UNHP) recognizes this fact and has taken the initiative to help Bronxites alleviate some of the stress that may arise while searching for work.

### HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE:

This guide is intended to help people looking for work find job placement and training programs available in the Bronx and surrounding areas. Included in this resource guide are programs, many of which are free of charge, to help job seekers gain skills for the workplace and find work. The list is not comprehensive, but it will give those looking for work a starting point. Once you find programs that are right for you,

use the information provided to contact the organization directly. Many programs have specific requirements, and those are listed along with the organization.

### TIPS ON GETTING STARTED:

#### **Assess where you are in your job search**

Preparing yourself for the job market can be complicated. It is useful to first understand where you are in your job search and what type of program you think you need. If you would like to improve basic skills such as reading, writing, math, computers, or communicating in English, then adult education programs might be a good place for you to look.

If you feel confident in these skills, and would like to learn how to do a specific type of work, job training and placement programs are most appropriate for you. If you have work experience already and are looking for a new career, you should check job listings and

perhaps enlist the help of the resume building programs. Additionally, there are programs for entrepreneurs interested in starting or expanding a small business. These programs offer advice, support, and occasionally access to funds to help you get started.

#### **Prepare for interviews**

It is important to look presentable and to show up on time for your appointment anytime you meet with a potential employer. If you need assistance getting clothes for your interview, please contact *LIFT the Bronx* at (718) 733-3897. Women can also contact *Dress for Success* at (718) 866-0666.



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#### **Stay positive**

In order to enroll in these programs and gain employment, you must be organized, persistent, and optimistic. It may be useful to set goals for yourself each day and make a timeline of when you want to accomplish certain tasks. For example, you might want to start by looking through this guide and making a list of the organizations you want to contact.

Next, contact those groups and set up meetings with those that interest you. After gathering more information and deciding what is right for you, enroll in a program or consult with a job placement organization to help you find the right job.

Remember to remain positive even if an opportunity has not presented itself during your active search. Keep options open and take a chance in seasonal and temporary work when available.





The program is for adults 24 years and up with a high school diploma or GED who are either receiving public assistance or are low-income. People in recovery are welcome, as long as they have been drug free for 6 months. Homeless persons are also welcome. You must be willing to commit to 39 weeks of class work and 90 days of post-placement follow-up. The New Leaf Program offers work experience, job readiness, and independent living skills to homeless persons and ex-addicts. Participants work in greenhouses and open gardens, gaining skills and hands on experience.


